+ April 9:

The Battle of Vimy Ridge during the First World War was a moment that defined our nation.

"It was the first time that soldiers from all four Canadian divisions—representing every region of our country—fought sideby-side on the same battlefield. As Brigadier-General Alexander Ross later said of Canada's accomplishments at Vimy, 'I witnessed the birth of a nation'.

"The capture of Vimy Ridge was one of the Great War's most remarkable military victories, but it came at great cost. Nearly 3,600 Canadians lost their lives and over 7,000 more were wounded.

"As we mark the anniversary of this historic battle, we are reminded of our obligation—to the fallen, to our Veterans, and to their families—that we must meet with respect and gratitude. Our men and women in uniform have dedicated their lives to the defence of our country, and they deserve our unwavering support.

"On this day, let us thank those who have sacrificed—and those who continue to sacrifice—on behalf of our country so that we can enjoy the peace and freedoms we have today."

"Today, we commemorate the **Battle of the Atlantic** and the <u>brave Canadians who</u> sacrificed to win the longest campaign of WW2" (1939 -1942; RCN and merchant marine; 4600 killed). Ceremony in NV.

EVEN ADDRESSES: Monday, Wednesday or Saturday **ODD** ADDRESSES: Tuesday, Thursday or Sunday Stage 1 sprinkling restrictions apply only to lawns. Watering of flowers, vegetable gardens, planters and shrubs is allowed outside restricted hours.

+ NOISE EXEMPTION for 1355 Bellevue from May 5 to Jan 31, 2017

At their April 4th regular meeting, West Vancouver Mayor and Council approved a noise exemption in your area. Ledcor Construction Ltd requested the Order of Non- Enforcement of the Noise Control Bylaw No. 4404, 2005 Section 6.1.2. for the construction site located at 1355 Bellevue Avenue.

The District's Noise Control Bylaw No. 4404, 2005 restricts construction noise to the following hours:

- 1. Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.;
- Saturday from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.; and
- 3. No construction noise permitted on Sundays and holidays.

This approval of the non-enforcement of this bylaw will allow large concrete pours for the project to take place within the following modified hours:

- 1. Monday through Friday from 7:00 a.m. and 7:30 a.m. and between the hours of 5:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.;
- Saturday from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.;

No construction noise permitted on Sundays and holidays.; and Max total 30 days of work approved for non-enforcement of the noise bylaw between May 5 - Jan 31, 2017

The building under construction at 1355 Marine Drive is designed as a post-tensioned structure and therefore incorporates large concrete pours as approved by the structural engineer. The District has been advised that on large concrete pour days, at least eight hours is required for concrete placement and two to three hours for the concrete to cure.

On days where large concrete pours will occur, residents and businesses can anticipate the following:

- w two concrete pumps arrive on site no earlier than 7:00 a.m.;
- [X] concrete pouring takes place no earlier than 7:30 a.m. until approximately 5:00 p.m.;
- [X] concrete finishing begins in the areas poured first, concrete cures for approx two hours depending on weather;

The noise associated with these large concrete pours involves concrete trucks arriving and leaving the site; use of concrete finishing equipment such as power trowels; and on rare occasion, concrete trucks and equipment related to concrete placement.

Staff have consulted with an independent industry expert who concluded that industry practice for post-tensioned concrete construction is to minimize the number of pours it takes to place a slab. Ledcor has confirmed that approx 30 large pours will require work beyond the hours allowed under the Noise Control Bylaw. These are scheduled to take place between May 5 and January 31, 2017. We recognize the impact this construction has had on your homes and your neighbourhood and we appreciate your continued patience as this project is completed.

Mirror reflections have multifarious interpretations: some view the image as objective truth, while others identify its inherent reversal as proof of the mirror's deception or illusion. Mirrors confine and frame the visible, although they may also exaggerate it infinitely —for example, when two mirrors face each other.

We are so used to viewing our reflection on a daily basis that we often fail to see who or what is staring back. The same is true of the photographic image: despite the complexities of photography, even the most atrocious scenes of conflict and war dissolve in the indiscriminate and ubiquitous depictions encountered in the media.

Sanaz Mazinani's recent photographic collages physically jar these images out of this mediascape. By presenting chaotic explosions in mirrored, kaleidoscopic arrangements that refuse to lie flat, Mazinani impedes a passive spectatorship; the representation of conflict is both visual and haptic.

Each work in Mirrored Explosions is an intervention in space, challenging the privileged vantage through which the politics of war are mediated. Problematizing both the mirrored reflection and the photographic lens, Mazinani ruptures our modes of observation, forcibly asking: how does an image's mediation affect moral or political judgements? To what extent are these images real to us? How can the implications of war be more visibly, and tangibly, understood through representation?

Mirrored Explosions is guest-curated by Pantea Haghighi.

Sanaz Mazinani is an artist, curator, and educator based in San Francisco and Toronto. She holds an undergraduate degree from Ontario College of Art & Design University, and a Masters in Fine Arts from Stanford University. She coedited the book ALMANAC: An Index of Current work and Thought (Stanford University, 2010). Recent curatorial projects include Edward Weston: On Light, Line and Form at Iris & B. Gerald Cantor Center for Visual Arts, Stanford University, and New Constellations: Contemporary Iranian Video Art at UCLA, Los Angeles, both in 2012.

Her works have been exhibited at the University of Toronto Art Centre, Museum Bärengasse, Zurich, Art & Architecture Library at Stanford University, Yerba Buena Center for the Arts, San Francisco, Gallery 44 Centre for Contemporary Photography, Toronto, and Émirates Financial Towers, Dubai. Mazinani's catalogue Unfolding Images was released in 2012. She has recently received grants from the Canada Council for the Arts and San Francisco Arts Commission. She was shortlisted for the 2013 Magic of Persia Contemporary Art Prize, granted the Kala Art Institute Fellowship, and awarded the San Francisco Arts Commission Art on Market Street public art installation for 2013-14.

Pantea Haghighi is an independent curator and owner of Republic Gallery. She is a graduate of the University of British Columbia Art History program. Curatorial projects include Unsent Dispatches from the Iranian Revolution, 1978-1979 at Presentation House Gallery in 2005, the Utopias Constructed series from 2014-18, Where/Between to be presented at Equinox Gallery in June 2016, and *Mirrored Explosions* at West Vancouver Museum in April 2016.

Description of field trip: We will explore the Sea to Sky Trail between Function Junction and Brandywine Falls while hiking the trail following the Cheakamus River.

This is moderately strenuous hike of 13-14 km. We will learn about geology, flora and fauna along the way.

"The heritage of the Sea to Sky Trail can be traced back to the historic travel and trade route of the Coast Salish and Interior Salish First Nations. These peoples would use the Sea to Sky corridor as a means of access between the Coast and the Interior. In the late 1700s and early 1800s European settlement expanded both on the Coast and into the Interior, as pioneers ventured in pursuit of gold and the expansion of ranches. It was at this time, the young province of British Columbia undertook their largest capital project to date, a cattle trail for ranchers around Lillooet to transport their cattle to the Vancouver markets. The trail proved too rigorous for the cattle, so the route was abandoned. But the idea of traveling through the Sea to Sky corridor persisted, eventually leading to the development first of gravel roads and railways, and then of highways and airports.'

Protecting West Vancouver Trees: a balanced and thoughtful approach

Trees are important to the residents of West Vancouver. Trees are a part of West Vancouver's identity and they help to set the community apart from other increasingly urbanized municipalities in Metro Vancouver.

In recent years, there has been an increased awareness by many in the community of the value that trees bring to the District including positive ecological and environmental benefits as well as community, social, economic and personal benefit. With this increased awareness, many residents are concerned that there is no specific bylaw in West Vancouver for the protection of trees on private lands.

This concern has been exacerbated by the now common practice of the complete clearing of lots for new or redevelopment. This practice results in the loss of significant tree cover generally and the loss of signature trees within West Vancouver neighbourhoods. The District has heard continued and increasing concern from the community regarding the loss of trees.

At the same time, the District recognizes and manages the effects of tree growth on amenities such as access to sunlight, views, and safety.

In response, the District will undertake community consultation regarding tree protection on private lands and report back to Council later this year. During this consultation period, an Interim Tree Bylaw is proposed to protect identified trees until Council considers a long-term strategy for tree protection on private lands.

An amendment for a smaller diameter was not mentioned however the good news is that Planning will be back though not as early as hoped, but earlier than the original in November, with the tree bylaw, <u>July 18.</u>

Geology of the Vancouver area as seen along Kitsilano Beach

Looking around Burrard Inlet, we will observe rocks and land forms that were created over the last 100 million years by plate tectonics, sea-level changes, and ice movement. The route will be rocky, damp, and slippery with many puddles left by the retreating tide so wear appropriate non-slip footwear.

When I got this notice (below), I was alarmed and asked who the parking was for. Someone told me that rhododendrons take a long time to grow/establish.

wrt openness, transparency and public consultation/input, pls let me know if you've been consulted.

The answer was:

There will be two new spots for Museum staff and visitors and the new gravel area will be allocated to contractors in order to try to alleviate some of the congestion on 17th and Fulton. When the Police Services and Municipal Hall Building has been completed, this parking will be opened for visitors to the Museum and MHall.

Museum vegetation removal and additional parking

The District will create additional parking in the lane adjacent to the Museum while construction of the Police Services and Municipal Hall building is underway to reduce parking congestion.

Work is scheduled to begin the week of June 13 taking approx one week to complete and will include:

removing the Rhododendron at the rear entrance to the museum parking lot;

removing the existing hedge on the north side of the lane adjacent to the Museum;

installing a gravel parking surface; and

replanting vegetation

This work will not impact the Jesse Binning tribute tree and measures will be taken to ensure that this tree is protected during construction.

Once the Police Services and M Hall bldg is complete, this new parking area will be open for public use and will increase the availability of public parking for MHall and Museum visitors.



When it comes to the salaries, wch is what I think you want -- you know we don't have to pass this, the budget, until May, so we do have some time for some more discussion and some work groups or some task forces

For example, I mean, is the budget going to have something per dept so we can see FTEs and how much is spent?

{pls note, there was no answer to this.}

One of the instances I was concerned about is that Brent Leigh, we were **told**, **that we wd save \$250K** -- wch is roughly his salary -- and I understood then, some of his tasks were given to the Cmnty Relations person, and others to the new Dir of Devt, and that was great; but **then**, **we found out there was someone being hired starting today wch did not come from the M, I found out through a pubn in Whistler -- someone starting at over \$150K a year with an assistant for \$60K a year**. So, I start to wonder, who is looking at depts and what's going on to make sure we hv efficient use of positions and payments.

If we were without this position for a year, I think that we shd look at how much it is needed and at the budget. I wo like to hear also from CcIr Lewis who during the campaign was saying something about "10 + 10", but to shorten it b/c we only have a certain time talking, is I really think we need more time to try to rationalize and reduce the cost of the staff, wch we all know is 80% of our budget, and cd be, possibly be, more efficiently used. Mayor: okay, I'm sure CcIr Lewis can cover those remarks during the debate. Thank you for coming up and making those points.

And then on the capital projects, I was told some of them were staff recommendations and some of them were things that were wished for by the cmnty, and that they had raised some money for. Now, perhaps I just didn't follow quite well, but I think it wd be useful and helpful, to have {a list} of all those recommended spending, if it said what was recommended by staff, what was recommended by the cmnty and the public, and if they raised funds, say how much the funds, how much of the funds they'd raised.

Lucinda Jones -- text supplied:

It has been a very busy week for anyone involved here in the Lower Mainland in environment issues, and the necessary building of a new economic paradigm.

Specifically for us in this coastal region there have been: three Town Hall Meetings hosted by our MP Pamela Goldsmith-Jones in order to collect public opinion and concerns over the Woodfibre LNG Ltd. proposal for a fractured and natural gas facility and export terminal in Howe Sound; an inspiring public address by our Minister of the Environment Catherine McKenna; and the outstanding opportunity to glean intellectual and spirited insight on climate change solution-making at this past week's GLOBE 2016.

Brilliant minds gathered from around the globe, as represented at the international Mayoral Roundtable, at the workshops and plenary sessions which altogether hosted renewable energy investors, educators, communicators, and policy writers from Helsinki to Surrey, B.C.

I would like to see the Community Energy and Emissions Plan group being able to benefit on this synergy in the development of the West Vancouver OCP.

I have sat in on a few of the CEEP working group meetings and am aware of the huge work load on the staff member Sandra Bicego, and would like to recommend further support for the ambition to actualize real progress in energy conservation and emission reduction. The commitment to the COP21 mandates and timelines are real and the bottom line is that our community must meet that challenge.

The working group could outline to each staff member the exact role that each could best assume. There is little need to re-invent the wheel as so many ideologies have become fully functioning systems which West Vancouver can easily research, synthesize, and actualize. For example, the C40 Cities Network to track implementation measures; the National Zero-Waste Council, chaired locally by Malcolm Brodie; Renewable Cities, One Earth, and OneUp, all in Metro Vancouver. Creating a culture of collaboration – intra-resident and intra-municipal government – is a positive community focus.

An interesting note brought forward by the deputy Mayor of Helsinki, Mr. Pekka Sauri, was that "our city's identity is no longer one of a service provider but one of facilitating openness to co-design the systems of the city with the citizens". Here in Richmond and Surrey, a great synergy exists for CEEP to conjoin.

In response to earlier comments this evening concerning affordability of maintaining the infrastructure of West Vancouver, I respectfully suggest that enquiry could be made into the Federal Infrastructure Bank which partners with energy providers, transporters, and infrastructure developers to serve communities with adequate long-term financing. Additionally, throughout the world, communities are partnering with renewable energy companies in order to retain varying degrees of ownership of their energy utility.

One last comment that I will make concerning energy conservation is that of the stores that front onto Marine Drive at Park Royal. The unabashed display of over-consumption of electrical lighting is a crass assault on pedestrians, people awaiting the bus and even on people driving by. And once again I must say that movement of people at Park Royal is very automobile-oriented.

> Rainer Fassler (notes provided, my abbreviations and bolding): As indicated in my short three-minute presentation to Ccl at the April 4th ccl mtg I wd like to summarize my thoughts regarding actions Ccl and staff might want to consider when addressing the issue of tree protection on public as well as on private land.

My eight points for your consideration are the following:

- 1. Impose a significant fine for cutting or damaging trees beyond a certain calibre. (Small fines will just be considered a cost of doing business.)
- 2. **Require that all trees beyond a certain calibre be documented** in the Building Permit submission based on a Legal Survey. Since the majority of significant trees are close to the property line the accuracy of the survey is absolutely essential, otherwise there will simply be too much room for fudging.
- Make a clear statement that trees that are partially on public land are "public trees".
- 4. Require a "Predesign Meeting" before excavation and before house design work is started to discuss the status of tree preservation on the specific property.
- 5. **Give the Planning and Devt Dept negotiation room** (adjustments to setback requirements, etc.) if it enables greater tree preservation on private land.
- 6. **Require real protection** of trees and vegetation on neighbouring properties and make Contractors and Developers responsible if damage occurs. "Over-excavation" kills too many trees.
- 7. Remove the current procedure that allows individual property owners to cut Boulevard Trees once they have collected a sufficient number of signatures from surrounding neighbours. This was attempted in our north and the action is often supported by owners in the process of selling their homes (an attempt to create more view). Blvd trees belong to all of us! If they are sick or damaged the M Arborist shd make the judgement call, not a property owner.
- 8. Consider making a statement as Council that speaks to the importance of tree preservation in terms of preserving our unique nbrhd character and protecting our envmt. Specifically ask for the support of the Devt Cmnty, the Real Estate Companies, and the Architects and Home Designers.

I strongly believe your action wd have an impact.

I wd like to thank all of Council for your the attention to this all-important community issue.

Elaine Graham: <u>I live at Point Atkinson Lighthouse</u>; <u>I'm here on behalf of the WV Historical Society</u> to alert you to the **installation of a CODAR antenna tomorrow morning** at Point Atkinson on the WW2 gun mount, a heritage feature of the site for wch the DWV and the Historical Society hv bn working towards.

In terms of the future of Pt A, since it is to be divested from the Coast Guard in 10 more years, we hv bn working toward an interpretive prog, and one of these features is this gun mount wch is designated as part of the National Historic site wch Pt A is. So the company that is installing the CODAR antenna is Ocean Networks Canada. They're affiliated with UVic and we [WVHS] were asked in September (17th) what they thought of four options for the placement of this antenna. The second option was their preferred option. None of the four options [was] ideal in terms of guidelines for these antennas, but the second was their preference. So we looked at the four-page document, four pictures of the locations, and the second option was in the vicinity to our vision -- this slender white antenna seemed to be growing out of the grass, and it said on the document that it wd be on the gun mount. We wrote back and said we wanted the heritage features to be kept intact, we wd like to see it placed beside the gun mount.

It was not until March 3rd this year that we learned, when OCN and Houle Electric arrived on site, that in fact the antenna

was to be placed on top of the gun mount.

If you know what this looks like -- I've just brought a picture here I can show you -- if you can see it from there -- It is quite a prominent concrete base, and the gun mount of the pedestal and the holding-down bolts are on top. They're rusting, but they are a heritage feature and as I mentioned, when ppl come to the site they learn about that feature, the search-light emplacement, the powerhouse -- all three --, and one more feature on the station. And, so, if the antenna is put on top of this

{holding up picture}

it is actually defacing a heritage feature.

{ding}

to cut a long story short, it took a lot of digging and email, all of wch is explained in the package I will leave, but the sequence of steps has revealed that Heritage Canada apparently approved this way back in August of 2015. So, my question to Ccl is:

Where do we go with this?

Why did DWV invest \$10K in a conservation feasibility study to guide us on how to look after this heritage site, and

why have WVHS been spending over ten years looking towards the future of the site, once it's no longer under DFO's control when this kind of thing can happen?

a company {OCN}, apparently a not-for-profit association like ours (though I will admit that it's got a lot more funding), can come in and just deface one of the character-defining elements of the site?

Mayor: appreciate [your] coming, and it sounds like a complicated issue, so I think staff need to get back to you with a response that they can formulate with some degree of expertise, okay? EG: tyvm

CR: tyvm. I completely support trying to preserve what Elaine Graham has just said about [that]. I'm on the Board of the Historical Society and am Chair of Heritage WV. We're v concerned and wd like staff to look at the process to see if there's something can be done to the procedures so that all these ppl are consulted. Elaine did put up a reasonable compromise for doing it. And I've been trying to phone Heritage Canada. It's v difficult to try to get through to someone. Now, to the trees. I do agree with trying to put it -- and thank you for trying, CcIr Cameron -- I think it wd be v helpful if you put inches as well as centimetres in all your information. How many inches is 75cm? [several said 30]

CR: so you're saying 30

{two and a half feet! That's an old and v big tree! Not many in Ambleside.}

so that's that. So I think -- and also, I don't take seriously that it's going to regrow.

{think saying 'grow back' wd hv bn better}

I remember I was talking, trying to defend trees many years ago, and I happened to be in an elevator in PkR and we looked over at Sentinel Hill and someone who was associated with BPP said: "Look at that! Look at all the trees on Sentinel Hill." And I said "yes."

Sentinel Hill." And I said "yes."

And he said, "Well, we clearcut that 30 years ago." And I looked at him and said: "Sir, I don't want to wait 30 years to get some trees back."

So I hope when we're doing the tree {bylaw} -- and I really applaud you for putting this through -- as a previous mayor told me, the two most contentious things in WV are trees and dogs. So you need to be commended for attending (?) to this, I

think it's tremendous what you're doing.

I also join the group that wants it to be a smaller amount

{my [sic]! shorter measurement?}

and I don't agree with cutting down one or two trees a year, but I'm sure we can work out some sort of compromise with collaboration and cooperation, but pls DO include, when you finally do it, the absorption and retention that the trees provide to prevent erosion.

In the Southern Hemisphere, ice mass loss from West Antarctica is pulling, and ice mass gain in East Antarctica is pushing, Earth's spin axis in the same direction that Greenland is pulling it from the north, but the combined effect is still not enough to explain the speedup and new direction. Something east of Greenland has to be exerting an additional pull.

The researchers found the answer in Eurasia: "The bulk of the answer is a deficit of water in Eurasia: the Indian subcontinent and the Caspian Sea area," Adhikari said.

The finding was a surprise. This region has lost water mass due to depletion of aquifers and drought, but the loss is nowhere near as great as the change in the ice sheets.

So why did the smaller loss have such a strong effect? The researchers say it's because the spin axis is very sensitive to changes occurring around 45 degrees latitude, both north and south. "This is well explained in the theory of rotating objects," Adhikari explained. "That's why changes in the Indian subcontinent, for example, are so important."




